

IN TODAY'S GOSPEL...

Before Jesus reached the house of the ruler of the synagogue, his clothes were touched by a woman who had been hemorrhaging for twelve years. Saint Marek uses a metaphor: he calls the hemorrhage "MASTIX", which means whip, a scourge. When she is healed from the hemorrhage, Jesus turns to the woman: "Depart into peace and be freed from you whip." Can we assume that behind this metaphor there is a non-figurative cause of long-term weakness?

Some people treat themselves with the same aggression as they were treated at home or in their immediate environment. They destroy themselves with the scourge of rejection when they were rejected. They have the worst opinion of themselves because this is the attitude they encountered at home. They beat themselves up with ruthless feelings of aggression because they were brought up ruthlessly. The bleeding woman clutched Jesus' robes from behind, as if she did not want to be seen or as if she was denying herself the right to be looked at. Self-aggressive women cannot look at themselves because they believe they are ugly or disgusting. No one treated their bodies with due respect, they were beaten verbally or physically, abused sexually or ridiculed.

It is important to note the differences between the whipping, which was used to describe this woman's illness, and the touching she resorted to. There is also a difference between hitting with a word and touching with a word. Someone does not have to be beaten at home by his or her parents; it is enough that he or she is constantly shouted at or is resented, insulted and dissatisfied by his or her father or mother, and such an attitude can become a self-reference. Sirach wrote: "The blow of the rod causes bruises, and the blow of the tongue breaks the bones. Many fell by the edge of the sword, but not as many as by the tongue" (28:17-18). We hear more and more about people engaging in self-harm.

A wounded person needs care, so some people hurt themselves to receive a substitute for the love and care they were deprived of from those from whom they should receive it. The hunger for love is a huge force. Where parents are emotionally unavailable and there is an atmosphere of emotional rejection or omission, where mothers — were focused on themselves or their partners, where the father was missing and where the child's most important need - the need for love - was pushed aside, children most often suffer from various forms of self-aggression. Let's add to this the increasing number of cases of child abuse and sexual abuse by fathers, stepfathers and siblings. Psychiatrists call the effects of child abuse a "soul murder."

In this bleeding woman about whom the evangelist writes, thousands of women could see their history summarized in her desire for the healing touch of Jesus' garments. If only I could touch myself his garment! Certainly, clinging to God who became man can heal one from the effects of the scourging of the flesh suffered by people.
